## "The Group"

I have often heard questions such as:

- ▲ "How do we keep our meetings membership from declining?"
- ▲ "How can we keep principles before personalities in our meeting?"
- ▲ "What can we do about individuals and groups that disrupt the meetings?"
- ▲ "How can we protect our group from getting kicked out of our meeting place?"

These are not new questions, as they have been coming up over and over since I entered AA in 1963. You would think with all the people entering the field of alcoholism treatment since then that we would have many new and innovative answers to these questions. In my experience the only effective answers have been the same ones used in 1963. These answers have always worked and are still referred to by their old name of "The Traditions".

In 1963 there were six meetings a week in Sonoma County, therefore the whole fellowship represented a continuous steering committee. AA has grown so much that we have many groups with no idea of a steering committee and a limited knowledge of the traditions. In many cases I have heard the traditions cherry picked to use only one or part of one to repre-

# HOSPITALS & INSTITUTIONS

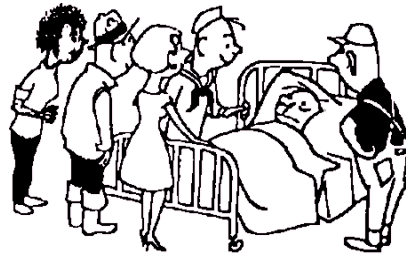
"Now, you can see right away that that behavior wasn't normal. In fact, that behavior then characterized my whole life. I was awkward physically, you remember, and I conceived therefore that I should become an athlete. Today I have an arm crooked from throwing rocks hours and days on end to strengthen it so I could become the pitcher of my board school ball team—and I did become the pitcher, and I did become the catcher.

"One day my grandfather came to me telling me how my uncle had a lot of musical talent, how well he played the fiddle. He intimated that I could never learn. I immediately rushed upstairs to the trunk in the attic, brought out old Uncle Clarence's fiddle, put a chip under its only string and determined that I would become the leader of the high school orchestra. At this moment I had never had a lesson in my life. In fact, I never did take any lessons; I insisted on learning myself. I drove people absolutely mad with my practice. In three years, I did become the leader of the high school orchestra, although I must confess it was a very bad orchestra. So it was all the way through boarding school. Now, you see by this time, in my own eyes, I was a success. I felt emotionally secure. I was a winner. I was a winner more than I was a joiner. For me, I was either on top of society or I was underneath it."

## Greetings Fellowship!

This is the busiest time of year for your General Service Representatives (GSRs), District Committee Members (DCMs) and CNCA Delegate. By now your GSRs have received the finalized Agenda Topics and you are probably well into your group sharing sessions. These are usually held right before or immediately following your regular AA meeting time, but may also happen on a different night, depending on what your group decides. Please show up to support your AA Group and GSR by participating in the sessions. Even if you do not initially understand the process or why you are needed there, trust that we DO need you and this is your chance to speak up and be heard as an AA member! Your GSR is working energetically for your group and needs your fresh ideas and perspectives. This is a WE program; each and every one of us does make a difference in the big picture.

As a GSR I facilitated a session last night with the AA group I have the privilege to serve. The Discussion/Topics are a good way to get started, for example, under the topic "Sponsorship: Working with Medical Practitioners, Other Professionals and Friends", our group had an in-depth discussion about the use of the term "court papers" by secretaries in meetings, whether or not it is an appropriate term, being that some folks may have papers signed for other purposes. Some felt that just by signing them we are implying affiliation. Others felt that we are practicing a spirit of cooperation and "being friendly with our friends" as Bill W. once said. This led to the topic of our primary purpose, which is to carry the message to the still-suffering alcoholic, and that although some alcoholics come to us unwilling and defiant, feeling "sentenced" to AA, they sometimes stick around and become grateful AA members. So, as you can see, the topics can initiate healthy group interaction. The sessions are open to all members of

the fellowship. This is how we voice our feelings and participate in expressing our "group conscience".

District 12 held its regular business meeting on March 3, 2003. We welcomed several new GSRs who are ready to serve their groups. Congratulations to the following members celebrating their AA

- 2) *That BTG be relieved of the criterion of a chairperson, who is a currently voting member in General Service proceedings.*
- 3) *That the relationship of General Service with PI/CPC, for example, be our model for the relationship of General Service with BTG."*

District 12 was blessed to have Francisco A. from Santa Cruz, CA. share his years of service experience in General Service. Francisco serves CNCA as the Alternate Delegate for Panel 53. 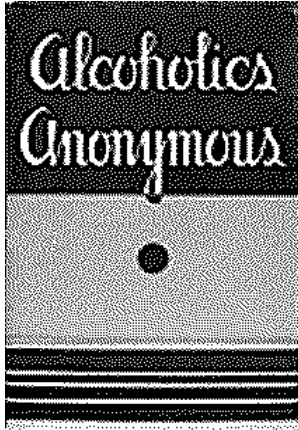

# PUBLIC INFORMATION REPORT

Your PI/CPC committee holds speaker-training workshops monthly to prepare new speakers for PI/CPC public speaking assignments, or freshen the skills of current speakers.

The committee meets in the Employee Lounge adjacent to the underground parking facility at City Hall in downtown Santa Rosa, accessible at the parking lot at First and D streets, on the second Wednesday of each month. Speaker training begins at 7:00 p.m., with the regular monthly business meeting following at 7:30 p.m.

Speakers usually work with a partner, with the first speaker explaining their role as members providing information about A. A. rather than being spokespersons expressing official views. Subject matter should be limited to Alcoholics Anonymous and its recovery program. The paramount importance of anonymity is stressed, with facts presented describing what A.A. is and isn't, what meetings are

like, what the Twelve Steps entail, etcetera. Care is taken to preserve 'amateur standing', avoiding expert claims on the medical, physiological, or psychological aspects of alcoholism. The second speaker usually tells a brief personal recovery story based on why they decided to seek help, what they found in A.A. that helped them, and how they feel and what their life is like today.



Often there are challenging questions from the audience that can be answered accurately with the help of training and study of A.A. literature.

"The role of A.A. in the community is thus revealed to the public, and above all, the message of our recovery to alcoholics can be carried through a 'third person'; often today's newcomer is making their initial approach to A.A. at the suggestion of a nonalcoholic well-wisher - a doctor, member of the clergy, lawyer, social worker, employer, union representative, relative, or friend to whom A.A. has become favorably known.
