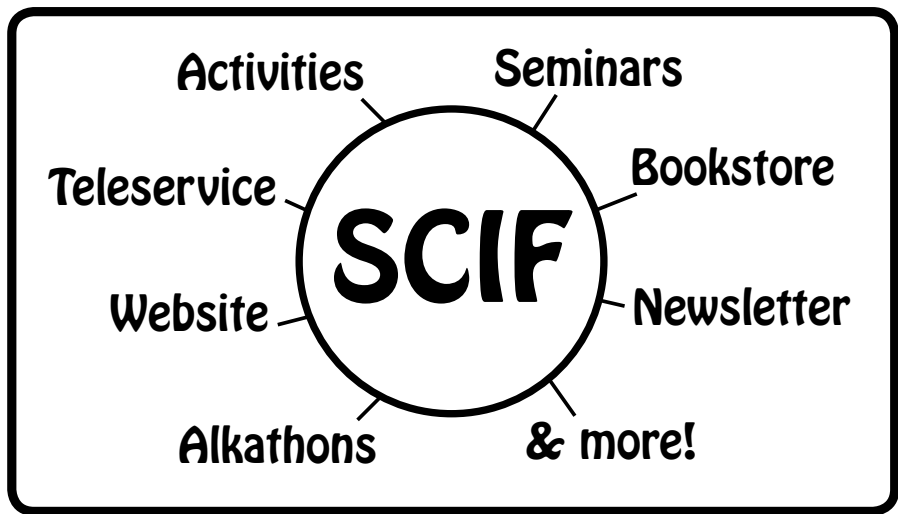

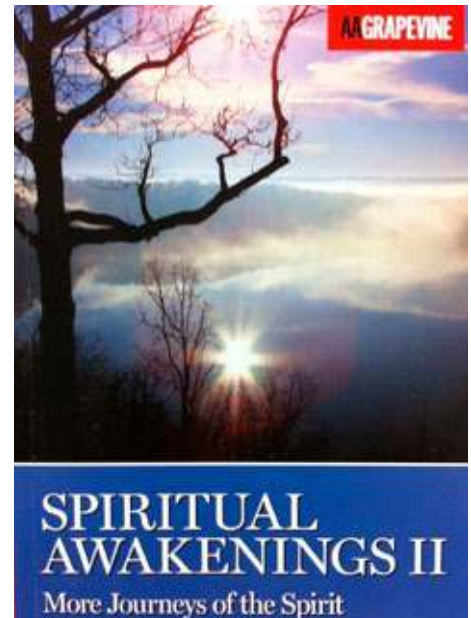
published hours on a consistent basis. We are currently fully staffed with volunteers but if you are interested, please come into the bookstore and fill out an application for future openings.

The A.A. Hotline needs volunteers to cover several shifts. Teleservice volunteers are often the first person that an alcoholic in need talks with. As a hotline volunteer, you are the voice of hope.

You can help alcoholic, as well as non-alcoholic, callers. Calls range from directions to meetings to Twelfth Step work. The following shifts are currently open:

Facts About the Intergroup Central Service Committee

The Intergroup Central Service Committee (ICSC) is a management and oversight committee specifically charged with responsibility to set the policy, regulate the affairs, and oversee the operation of the SCIF Central Office/Bookstore. It also advises the Steering Committee on matters affecting SCIF's status as a non-profit corporation, making sure that state and federal government regulations are followed and regulatory filings are completed as required. As such, it fulfills many of the functions cited as responsibilities of "the Board of Directors" in the California Corporations Code.

The ICSC is a rotating body of five members – two officers and three at-large members elected by the group representatives. The composition of the ICSC committee changes several times a year, providing both continuity and fresh eyes.

BRIDGING THE GAP

My name is Tom F. and I'm an alcoholic and the current chairman of Bridging the Gap (BTG). I took this position a little over a year ago, reluctantly. It's never been an easy decision for me to take long commitments, and this one was no different, but looking back at the last year or so I can do it with a sense of satisfaction knowing that the work performed possibly helped a fellow alcoholic. I originally heard about BTG during announcements while at a regular A.A. meeting. I was pretty new and my sponsor had told me to find a service commitment that I liked and to stay with it for awhile, so I went to the BTG business meeting and made myself available as a phone coordinator. Now, 7 years later I am still with this committee and I tell people, "all that service work does for you is keep you sober." So far, so good!

At BTG we give presentations at various rehab facilities in Sonoma County. We offer the people there a contact person who will get them to, or meet them at a meeting that is close to the newcomer's home area. Those contact people are volunteers, those volunteers are you, the members of this Fellowship. We match up the newcomers with volunteers of the same sex, age group (if possible) and area of where the newcomer lives. The volunteers don't get a lot of calls due to the way we match people up, but if you are not on the volunteer list, there may be a newcomer that needs you but can't find you. We average 30 requests a month for a local volunteer contact. We are always looking for more volunteers, especially in the outlying areas. If you would like to be on the list, please pick up an application from your regular meeting's literature table, ask your General Service Rep. for one, or get my information from the back of the newsletter. You just might save a life, and it might be your own.

"What can a teenager do if their parents won't stop drinking alcohol and also want their kids to drink?" "If I have blackouts am I an alcoholic?" "Why did you think alcohol was the answer to your problems?" Aren't those amazing questions? They were asked by high school freshman at just one of our presentations. What an amazing experience this is! We get to go into the classrooms two at a time. One person gives a brief history of A.A., also explaining what to expect at a meeting. What A.A. is and is not. Next we have a young person share their story. Then we take questions from the students. The questions are written on 3x5 cards and passed to the front, so nobody stands out or feels self conscious. This is such a great way to spread the message. There is hope. We do recover.

PI/CPC stands for Public Information and Cooperation with the Professional Community. Our committee provides speakers and literature to non-A.A. groups such as DUI classes, schools and any other professional organizations that may request information about Alcoholics Anonymous. We are greatly in need of more young speakers with at least two years of sobriety to enable us to go into more schools.

We are also asking for donations of old Grapevines. We have been distributing these and found it to be very successful. If you have any old copies, please drop them at the Bookstore. If you are interested in our committee or you would like to become a speaker, PI/CPC meets the second Wednesday of the month at the S.R. City Hall Underground. Speaker training is at 7pm. The business meeting is at 7:30pm.
