NOR-CAL PRIMARY PURPOSE GROUP

Argument in Favor or Re-instating the Nor-Cal Primary Purpose Group into the SCIF Meeting Schedule

The SCIF Steering Committee (SCIF SC) informed the Nor-Cal Primary Purpose Group (NCPPG) that they are violating the Sixth Tradition and are being removed from the meeting schedule. Any violation of the Sixth Tradition would mean that the offending group would be acting in a manner which would "divert us from our primary purpose". Oddly, the SCIF SC has ruled that the NCPPG is conducting its meetings contrary to NCPPG's designed intention of carrying the message found in the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous.

The Sixth Tradition, in the long form, ends with another test stating; "An A.A. group can bind itself to no one." It could be argued that the best definition for "bind" in the context of the Sixth Tradition would be, "to unite by any legal or moral tie". The NCPPG has never entered into any type of legal instrument with any other outside group or enterprise. Yet, it could be argued that they share a philosophical tie with another AA Group in Texas, in that they have a common bond in forwarding A.A.'s "Primary Purpose" of carrying the message to the Alcoholic who still suffers.

To the fact that NCPPG is using a text that is not A.A. Conference approved literature as a study guide - - let's look at two things. First, the content of the study guide is the "First Edition" of the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous, which A.A. lost the copyright to when the original text of the First Edition lapsed into public domain in 1967. A.A.W.S. failed to renew the 1939 copyright and others started re-printing it in 1985. But the fact remains that the book presently being used by NCPPG is a re-printing of the First Edition of the Big Book, which has not changed in content in subsequent printings.* Any assertion that the text used by NCPPG is from an outside source is splitting hairs.

If SCIF SC is using the argument that the text used by NCPPG is not A.A. Conference approved and therefore implies an affiliation with an outside entity, as a fellowship we should conduct some personal house-keeping regarding SCIF as a whole. Our bookstore is full of inventory for sale, which benefits SCIF, that comes from a wide variety of sources that have no connection to A.A.W.S. and are not Conference approved items.

One last item to note, in the SCIF newsletter last month it was commented by SCIF SC that NCPPG had not made any contributions to SCIF since its inception and in not doing so was not self supporting. This was a troubling affirmation to be voiced publically. If this argument was asserted to all the meetings listed in the meeting schedule it is feared that a number of other meetings could be removed from the schedule as well. Further discussion on this matter of self support should include SCIF SC to refer to Concept VII for clarity concerning the "power of the A.A. purse".

Introduction of New Business: Sean explained that process of motions that come to General Meeting.

Motion – ICSC seeks group’s approval to accept Debit and/or Credit Cards at the SCIF Bookstore. (Motion by Trevor H, second by Chris M: 7 in favor, 0 not in favor, 1 abstain.) Speaking for motion, Trevor H: Looking at 28 cents per transaction, may have minimum purchase amount in order to use card. Means an approximate expense of \$160 per \$3,000 sales. Could be slight increase in book cost. Noted other AA bookstores have experienced increase in sales with acceptance of cards. Speaking against motion, Gene H: As a past ICSC chair know this topic has been talked about several times. Felt liability would be big risk. Feel the expense to bookstore is one we couldn’t get back on sales. Eventually this will be implemented. We have a shortfall right now and not good time to add additional expense to bookstore. Nothing says we will increase sales. Nicer to see rates in writing. **Motion tabled and discussion next month.

Motion from Nor-Cal Primary Purpose Group – We request that SCIF not remove the Nor-Cal Primary Purpose Group from the Sonoma County AA Meeting Directory. Sean noted that the steering committee discussed and debated the outside affiliation of Primary Purpose, had asked representatives from group to come to steering committee to ask and answer questions. After further discussion steering committee voted to remove Primary Purpose from directory on Tradition Six solely. We informed the group and they brought a motion to the steering committee to be relisted. Speaking for the motion, Steve: Strictly with sixth tradition not intended to be used with groups. No authority to take us out of directory – take a look at Traditions Two and Nine. Affiliation? We use a study guide, not required. We’re listed on the Primary Purpose website. The study guide is not AA approved literature. Speaking against the motion, Chris M: The affiliation creates confusion – is Big Book the study guide? **Motion tabled and discussion next month.

Group Representatives Sharing: Bob reminded about Cache Creek, deposits due by May 1. Paul said flyer from Access Sonoma regarding dual diagnosis is not AA approved literature.

Summation: What to Take Back to Your Groups

The meeting was closed with the Responsibility Statement at 9:03pm.

PICPC NEWS

Your Public Information/Cooperation with the Professional Community (PI/CPC) Committee is a sub-committee of General Service. We meet once a month on the 2nd Wednesday in the Santa Rosa City Hall employees’ lounge next to the underground parking area at 7:30 pm. Each month the meeting is preceded by a speaker training workshop that begins at 7:00 pm. Any Alcoholics Anonymous member who is interested is welcome to attend. One of the main functions of the committee is to prepare and provide speakers for non-AA groups, such as DUI classes, school classes, and more. The monthly workshops prepare new speakers for these public speaking assignments and are available to refresh the skills of current speakers also. Normally, a newly trained speaker later observes a PI presentation at a DUI class. There he or she will be able to see in action what they learned at the workshop.

At a DUI class, typically, one person speaks for twenty or twenty-five minutes and introduces Alcoholics Anonymous, describing it to people who mostly have not been to an AA meeting. This will include reading the AA Preamble, “Alcoholics Anonymous is a fellowship of men and women who share their experience, strength, and hope with each other that they may solve their common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism Our primary purpose is to stay sober and to help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.” The first speaker discusses the disease of alcoholism as it is described in the Big Book of AA, anonymity, sobriety and meetings. We explain what open and closed meetings are. We talk about what AA is and isn’t. I like to say something inviting such as, “If you would like to check AA out, you are always welcome at any open meeting.” I bring AA meeting schedules and give out the local AA hotline phone number 544-1300. (Thanks to the teleservice volunteers who give so generously of their time to be available to the alcoholic seeking help by phone!)

The second AA speaker tells their personal recovery story. This is similar in many ways to telling our story at an AA meeting. We are careful to use language that everyone understands and to avoid AA jargon that might confuse someone who has never been to an AA meeting or is new.

Then, if time allows, there is a question and answer period. It is a good idea for both speakers to have read the pamphlet “Speaking at Non-AA Meetings” ahead of time to get guidance. It includes a few pages of questions most frequently asked at non-AA meetings. “44 Questions” is also helpful. We always make it clear that we do not speak for AA as a whole, but are expressing our interpretations based on our personal experiences.

Our speakers have a working knowledge of the steps and no less than two years of sobriety. This is just one of the service opportunities in PI/CPC. One other thing we do is distribute AA literature and meeting schedules to non-AA groups. If you would like to participate, you may attend the monthly meeting or contact us (information is on the back of this newsletter).

BTG Sonoma County needs more volunteers especially in West County. But please don't shy away because you don't live there.
