Representatives were asked to sign in.

#### **ELECTION OF COMMITTEE/LIAISON:**

**General Service Liaison:** David elected by majority - former Spanish Central Office liaison, just finished term, happy to be new SCIF GSR Liaison.

#### **COMMENTS REPRESENTATIVE SHARING:**

Selection for the group to speak for 1 min: why you are here and why is it important to you. "Keeping busy, helps me in my sobriety. Important to me to give back to the community and I love it."

Comment from Noel - Tuesday Night Beginners Group is coming back, tomorrow is last Steering committee meeting at 6pm at the AA bookstore, every position is available. First meeting on Tues.12/2 at 7pm at 1550 Pacific Ave Santa Rosa.

#### **OFFICER REPORTS:**

CHAIR: Joshua P. - nothing to report

**VICE CHAIR: Angie G.** - New reps on zoom, please come to orientation, 7pm before the General Meeting. There are New Rep guides on the website.

**SECRETARY: Amy P.** - not present, nothing to report.

TREASURER: Mike H. - See report on pages 5 & 6.

Also filed corporate tax returns. Free checking at cooperating banks in Santa Rosa. We will go with whatever bank you want to go with so you won't have to use a members' checking account for your group with an independent tax ID # you won't have to pay monthly charges for that. For further info contact Bob at the bookstore or you can contact Mike via email.

NEW SPACE - starting at \$1,500 p/mo in it's final form SCIF authorized to go ahead with this project. The lease is between this group, so in order to sign the lease we need to have a vote. Questions: Greg - How will space be used? Primarily for meetings, we will establish a rent for each meeting, possible \$25-50 per meeting, also for committee meetings, more sales floor. More will be revealed. Second question about how we get the money to pay the rent, hopefully we will have plenty of meetings who want to use the space. We have surplus revenue \$13K - not part of prudent reserve which is \$48K. Max occupancy is 75-100. Vote passed by majority.

**REGISTRAR:** Stacy T. - Total of 465 meetings each week, offered by 248 groups; 328 in person; 115 online and 22 hybrid; last meeting we had a total of 53 reps and 30 in person 23 online and 5 new. 21% of meetings were represented.

ICSC REPORT: Joann L. - Ernest is now recording Secretary for next 6 mos. We discussed bookstore consignment inventory and leave it to the discretion of the bookstore manager. Added GSO guidelines for Intergroups and Central offices, put them in newsletter.

BOOKSTORE REPORT: Bob F. - New line of sterling silver jewelry, by consignment. New AA Books seminar bundle, books that are going to be talked about in that seminar with a bunch of extras. Newcomer packets, also need volunteers to help make them. Want to express gratitude for all of the bookstore volunteers. Please let me know if you would like to volunteer.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

**OUTREACH:** Morgan P. - Encouraging every group to get an intergroup rep. so that we can identify their meeting. Identified that many of the meetings on the 1<sup>st</sup> we count as Spanish-speaking meetings - we thought they weren't being represented, but they have their own intergroup. WEBMASTER: Jay F. - People asking why they can't print schedules from the website. Looking into ways that can happen. Be aware the meetings on the website are as up-to-date as possible. PI/CPC is getting a SF Bay Area Professionals page. Reach out to me if your committee would like a page or has any questions.

**SEMINARS: Clark W.** - January seminar will be held in the new space next to the bookstore. Mon. January 19, 6-7:30, hybrid. Next seminar will be in April and will probably be about service. All types of service position perspectives. We pledge 100% of 7<sup>th</sup> tradition towards rent.

# Registrar's Report for November, 2025

As of November 24, 2025, there were a total of 465 meetings in Sonoma County offered by 247 unique groups each week: 331 in-person, 110 on-line, and 24 were hybrid.

A total of 43 representatives were in attendance at the November 24<sup>th</sup> Intergroup Meeting. 28 were in person and 15 on-line. 7 were new.



# The Ripple Effect: PI/CPC and the 'Every 15 Minutes' Program



The request that came to the PI/CPC committee meeting, notes like a dropped stone given it is not something we have done: "Petaluma Police Department needs a speaker for a local high school for their 'Every 15 Minutes' program... in a few weeks and they need to know if we can support this in the next couple of days."

<u>Every 15 Minutes</u> is a program to build awareness of the dangers of drinking and driving by simulating a car crash and the aftermath (hospital visits, jail, mortuary etc.). They needed a speaker with personal experience with a drunk driving accident that caused serious injury or death to share their story to the assembly the day after the reenactment.

PI/CPC did a quick outreach to our wonderful speaker community. This was a different kind of service. We usually talk about recovery, not tragedy, but this presented an opportunity to educate the 'kids' in cooperation with professionals in our community. One of our speakers met the requirements and was willing to share the story of his wife being seriously injured by a drunk driver.

On the second day of the program, the students passed a hearse as they entered the gym. The group was silent, heavy with manufactured dread. On the first day, four first responder agencies, the local hospital and a mortuary had collaborated to stage the mock crash, the fake fatalities and related death notices, and the drunk driving arrest, with students playing the roles. The scene had been raw, designed to shock.

Scott W. in our speaker community stepped up to share a moving story about a drunk driver that seriously wounded his wife in an accident. The impact on the driving-age kids was obvious. Thanks to Scott for being vulnerable for the betterment of others.

The PI/CPC committee's service that day showed that carrying the message sometimes means sharing the experience of those who were collateral damage. It reminds us that our recovery is not just for ourselves, but for all the lives we touch—and that service is the ultimate act of gratitude.

# PI/CPC Update: Impact at St. Vincent's & Call for Speakers Carry the Message where it's needed most—Schools & DUI Classes need you.

This month, the Public Information / Cooperation with the Professional Community (PI/CPC) committee had the privilege of participating in the "Every 15 Minutes" program at St. Vincent's High School. While AA is usually not invited to these events as members from MADD usually make the presentation, Scott W. shared his experience, strength, and hope regarding the severe consequences of alcoholism and drunk driving. The response from the student body was powerful, illustrating just how vital our presence is in the community.

We need your help to keep this momentum going! We are always looking for speakers for both *High School presentations* and *DUI classes*. This is one of the most effective ways to carry the message to the "still suffering alcoholic" who may not have walked into a room yet.

#### Get Involved:

- Requirements: 2+ years of sobriety and a working knowledge of the Steps/Traditions. (And only 1+ years for younger speakers)
- Training: We hold a brief, Speaker Training session at 7:00 PM on the second Wednesday of every month, immediately preceding our business meeting.
- Next Meeting: January 14, 2026 at the bookstore (we'll be in the new office space next door to the bookstore then)

#### **Dead Girl in the Meadow**

I was barely eighteen when I moved to Santa Cruz for college. My hair was long and blonde—down to my chest—and I thought I knew everything there was to know about drinking. My poor roommate, on the other hand, was a lightweight. So I figured I'd show him the ropes.

I'd arrived early that year to work in the dining hall, but he'd only just shown up. Within a few hours, we were both at a freshman party in the grassy meadow behind our dorm, passing around plastic bottles of cheap vodka. He hit his limit early. I hauled him back to our dorm and tucked him into bed, feeling like the seasoned pro taking care of the new kid.

Me? I was just getting started.

The next thing I remember is sirens. Blinding lights. Angry firemen. The sound of students cracking their windows to watch the scene unfold. Someone had called 911 to report a "dead girl in the meadow." Campus security arrived first and confirmed what looked like a body facedown at the bottom of the ditch behind our dorm—long blonde hair spread out in the grass.

Three cop cars, two fire trucks, one ambulance. And then: me. Drunk as hell. Not dead, just passed out in the dirt.

I think the firemen were actually disappointed to see me sit up.

Campus policy said severely intoxicated students should go to the hospital to be rehydrated. But I was such a little asshole that night that they sent me to county jail instead. I spent the night in the tank, sobered up on a concrete bench, and somehow walked back into class the next day as if nothing had happened. People even treated me like some sort of returning hero.

For years I told that story as a joke.

Now, in sobriety, I see it for what it was: a tragedy of my former self.

I was so uncomfortable in my own skin that I used alcohol as a shield from the world and from myself. I wasn't partying—I was destroying myself at every opportunity. And I truly believed it was normal, that I was in control, that I was having fun.

It took me twenty-two years to put that drunk kid away.

Since getting sober, I went back to that meadow with my two daughters. They played and ran around the ditch while I watched them laugh. I realized I was rewriting the memory, replacing shame with joy, recklessness with gratitude, drunken collapse with presence.

That's what AA has given me: the chance to turn painful memories into meaningful ones, and the opportunity to finally feel comfortable in my own skin.

Maybe my girls will never hear that old story. And if they do, I hope it's told as a story of how far their dad has come.

# **General Service Corner**

Since we are in the 12<sup>th</sup> month I thought discussing the 12<sup>th</sup> Concept was appropriate, and dare I say—festive? *The 12<sup>th</sup> Concept* (short form) is as follows:

The Conference shall observe the spirit of A.A. tradition, taking care that it never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds and reserve be its prudent financial principle; that it place none of its members in a position of unqualified authority over others; that it reach all important decisions by discussion, vote, and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that its actions never be personally punitive nor an incitement to public controversy; that it never perform acts of government; that, like the Society it serves, it will always remain democratic in thought and action.

I was confused the first time I read this. What helped me was learning about how this concept encompasses the Six Warranties (12 concepts and 6 warranties seems like a lot to keep track of, I wish I could tell you it's not, it just is what it is. Turns out all the pieces are there for a reason). I have translated the six warranties, with the help of *The 12 Concepts Illustrated Pamphlet* for us:

- 1. Humility is needed when it comes to money + power.
- 2. Finances: prudent, stable, dependable.
- 3. Power is balanced + limited.
- 4. Decisions come from discussion + voting (minority voice is heard and respected).
- 5. No punishments + no public drama ever.
- 6. The conference serves, it does not govern.

The gratitude I have for the way in which these Six Warranties have shaped our Fellowship of the Spirit is deep and steady, like that grounding reminder that God's got it. Getting to be a part of AA and specifically a part of General Service has allowed me to witness and practice these broad concepts at the Area Level, District Level, Sub-District Level, Meeting Level, Sponsorship Level, and maybe most importantly, in my own personal life.

- 1. I see that humility, especially as it relates to money and power, is necessary for my life.
- 2. I get to have the understanding that financial security is not from having more money, but by being prudent and stable with money.
- 3. Power is not something I do on my own.
- 4. When I am making a decision it is important to hear all sides, respectfully.
- 5. I do not need to punish anyone, including myself. There is no need for drama.
- 6. I am here to be useful.

These Warranties for our Fellowship have become personal promises during my time in General Service. Thank you for letting me be of service.
