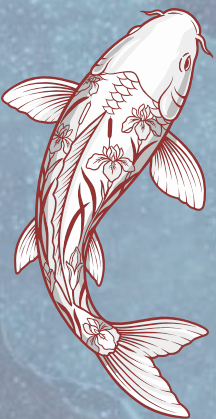

## **Representative Sharing – Laurie**

Laurie shared excitement for longer-term commitment, bringing her authentic self, group commitment, and giving back while helping keep it going. Kind of a “leveling up” avenue of service.

## **Officer Reports**

### **Chair-Joshua**

Sharing chair responsibilities. The recording secretary vacancy in ICSC has been filled by Amanda. Progress ensues with SCIF inventory, question sheets are being taken back to groups.

### **Vice Chair- Scott**

Appreciation and enjoyment were shared. Secretary. Motion passed to accept April’s meeting minute. Ray / Clark were noted as second.

### **Treasurer – Mike**

Newsletter finances were reviewed. Funds continue coming from the store, meeting hall, activities, and contributions. The meeting hall nearly broke even, with approximately \$3,350.70 net across entities. The Treasurer forum meets the last Monday at 6:00 PM. The Northern Coastal Area AA Intergroup self-support forum will be on Zoom June 11 from 6:00–7:30 PM.

### **Registrar– Angel**

Outreach and “Light a Fire” were discussed. Numbers will be included in the newsletter. An Excel form is being created for new groups, groups not yet visited, and a visit list. 20% of groups are being represented with an SCIF representative.

### **ICSC – Laurie**

Laurie reported on improvements and organizing. Standard operating procedures are in progress. Amanda is taking notes. Roles, responsibilities, and skills were discussed. Banking challenges for groups were mentioned, and ICSC is available to help. A reminder was given about the Treasurer forum.

## **Bookstore – Bob**

Bob reported on the central office and meeting hall. Volunteers are needed for 4-hour shifts. Men’s Saturday coverage is 10–6. Good espresso was noted. Pamphlet of the month was shared. FAQ in large print was approved. Back to Basics, Big Book Awakening, and the Marty Mann biography were mentioned. Dogs on leash are allowed. Banks may classify groups as businesses, and the bookstore can provide a letter. Steering minutes are available.

### **PI/CPC**

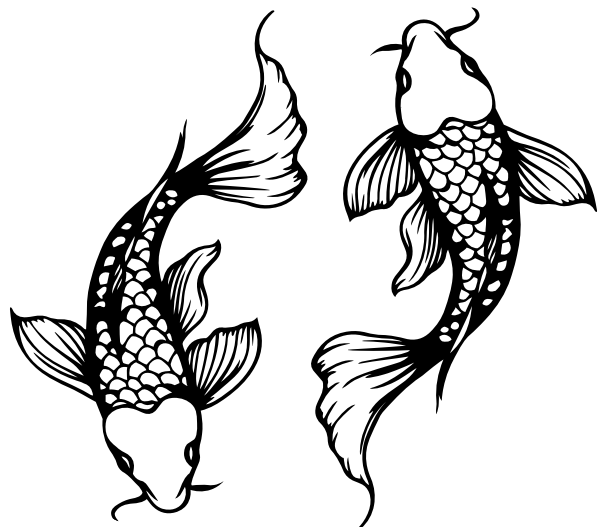

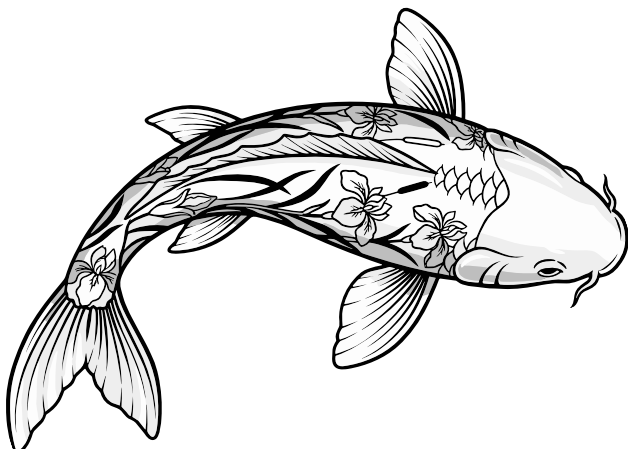

Tradition Five: Each group has but one primary purpose — to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

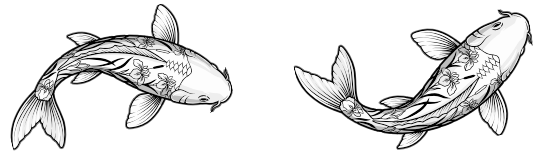
1. Is our group attracting alcoholics from different backgrounds? Are we seeing a good cross section of our community, including those with accessibility issues?

# The Gift of General Service

When I first came into AA in 1989, my sponsor took me to a General Service committee meeting. I found it overwhelming, incomprehensible and secretly, quite frankly, boring. That was it for me and General Service for the next few decades.

Then I made a new friend. I wanted to spend time with her but she was always busy on the weekends volunteering for General Service events. I started tagging along, just to get to see her. God was working in my life, but I didn't see it right away. Then I realized that I was enjoying the events and paying attention to what was happening. I was learning about how AA functions and getting to know some really cool people who are spiritual and kind, generous and unselfish, energetic and humble. Nothing like my preconceived ideas.

General Service is the engine of AA. It the way that the message travels from the individual members of the group gathered together, represented and communicated through a series of steps all the way to our General Service Organization in New York. And in reverse, any message or action taken by GSO is communicated back through the same steps to the group.

Any single alcoholic who wishes to make his opinion heard in New York is entitled to do so by the motion process, which carries an idea through the series of steps. This is what makes AA a true Democracy. Everyone has a voice and everyone has a vote.

Some other things that General Service does is carry the message of AA to the rest of the world, connecting us with other countries through translated books and literature. New countries join AA every year. GS also co-ordinates all of AA's other services, including the Grapevine, in all its forms, our public service announcements, creating new content for literature, and safeguarding our Founder's original writings. In this way the conference keeps AA alive and moving forward while protecting our legacy. I am not informed about every aspect of our General Service as I have just started my General Service journey. There is a Website, an App and a Service Manual available at the bookstore. I suggest checking out any or all of these resources to find out more.

The theme of this year's (the 76th annual) General Service Conference is Humility in action. I heard our Delegate, Chitra, who is a true inspiration speak on on this and many other topics while giving her report. She talked about how leadership and service in AA is not about titles and ambition, but rather about willingness, responsibility, and being open to new understanding. I have seen these qualities in the members of General Service that I have met in my short time being involved.

I want to finish with something our Delegate said which really epitomized the spirit of General service to me. " No personal sacrifice is too great for the preservation of the fellowship" And I want to convey that General Service is far more than its dry and rigid reputation. It is a true source of spiritual growth and deep, wonderful AA friendships that will last a lifetime.
