ELECTION / ICSC NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Kay made herself available for the ICSC Nominating Committee and qualified herself and voted in by majority.

WHY SERVICE

Jamie shared about moving to Sonoma County two years ago, finding fellowship, and how service—and simply showing up—transformed life in sobriety.

Noel has been single handedly been being of service working on a Sonoma County Step working guide. The fellowship decided upon this and we need more volunteers to be part of the process and creation. Writing sessions take place at the Bookstore @6pm on the first Tuesday of the month.

OFFICER REPORTS

SCIF Chair: Joshua reported on Steering Committee updates, continued conversations regarding the Eskimo Group name, and the possibility of reviewing additional recovery literature for the bookstore.

Vice Chair: Filling in for Scott, Steven reported that the move to a larger Intergroup storage unit was completed and thanked everyone who helped.

Secretary: The previous month’s minutes were presented. A motion was made and seconded, and the minutes were approved.

Treasurer: Financial reports were presented. The bookkeeping position remains under review following the previous bookkeeper’s resignation, and the CPA position remains open.

Registrar: Angel was absent.

ICSC Report: Laurie reported that bookstore inventory was completed. The committee continues reviewing bookstore operations, meeting-hall procedures, volunteer documentation, and development of a volunteer guide

BOOKSTORE, CENTRAL OFFICE & MEETING HALL

-August Book of the Month: Dr. Bob and the Good Old timers (Bruce’s Story), \$15.20.

-Board-approved titles are now available in the Outside Recovery Materials section: Back to Basics, Big Book Awakening, and Joe McQ.’s Carry This Message. These well-respected resources support A.A. 12 Step work and tie in with the SCIF Step Working Guide. Noel is doing the 12 Step Study Guide.

-Bookstore volunteer shifts are filled, and a waiting list is open.

-The bookstore sold 1,100 Big Books in 2025 and more than 580 year-to-date.

-The Meeting Hall LED ceiling-panel fundraiser reached its goal with a Seminar Committee donation, allowing purchase and installation without group contributions.

-Central Office is working with the Spanish-speaking community to develop in-house support literature.

-Weekday midday meeting slots are available.

-Grapevine greeting cards are on sale: 5 for \$10.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Outreach: Travis reported continued meeting visits and growing connections with representatives.

Activities: Chris requested volunteers and subcommittee chairs for the Halloween Dance.

Alkathon: Meg's written report noted that lottery flyers are expected for the August meeting. Work continues on the budget and backup locations.

Seminars: Clark- Planning continues for the September 12 seminar, including fellowship and fundraising to benefit the Meeting Hall.

Teleservice: Maria reported that all shifts are covered.

Tech: Jake reported that technology is functioning well and introduced a new assistant helping with technical support.

ACCESS SONOMA COUNTY

Access Sonoma County meets on the second Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. on Zoom. Planning continues for an October workshop, "Diversity and Inclusion in A.A." The date and location are still being determined, and help is welcomed.

GENERAL SERVICE

District 12 elected three new Panel 75 officers: a District Committee Member for the East Santa Rosa sub-districts, a Recording Secretary, and a Newsletter Correspondent. The Grapevine Chair remains open. The Healdsburg Group is preparing an October 17 event celebrating 75 years of A.A. in Healdsburg.

SOCYPAA

The most recent event drew more than 40 attendees. The next event will be an Ocean Meeting. SOCYPAA is exploring support for a new young people's meeting in Sonoma Valley Fellowship, which currently has none. BiPAC and Facilities Chairs are open while the committee continues its ACYPAA bid; members with experience are encouraged to help. Bylaw changes are underway. Inventory will be held Sunday, August 30, at noon at 1551 Montgomery Drive. Join us!

UNITY DAY

The date and venue are locked, and the meeting schedule is in progress. A theme and logo contest is underway, and an after-party/dance is being considered. Lunch will be chili verde. The committee is addressing previous audio issues with IT early and has received seed money from General Service and H&I. Volunteers are needed for baskets/drawings, parking, breakfast, cleanup, drinks, and floater positions.

OLD BUSINESS

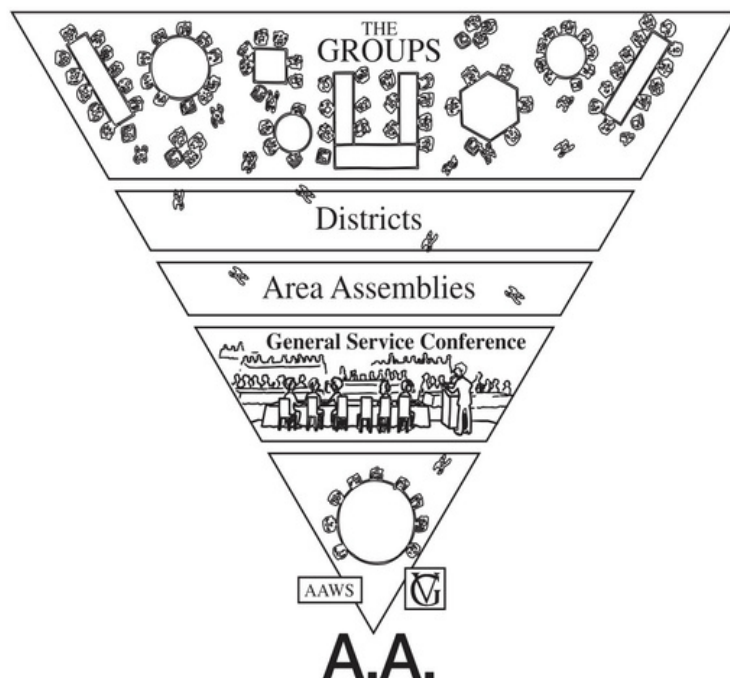
Inventory questions continue to be taken back to the groups for group conscience. Representatives were encouraged to continue discussing the inventory process with their home groups.

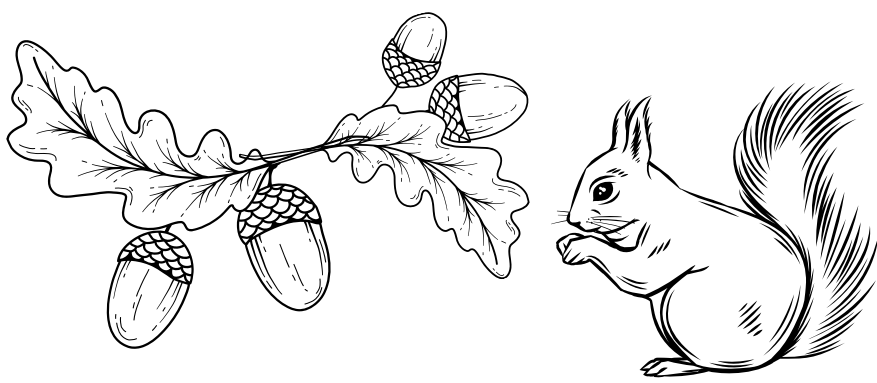

Chanting and Clapping

While speaking at a DUI class a while ago, I asked if there were any questions or comments after my presentation. A young man spoke up.

“I went to an AA meeting, but I didn’t really understand what was going on. The people there were saying prayers, chanting, and clapping. I didn’t get it. I felt like I was the only one there who didn’t, so I left.” I told him he need not worry. If it was a typical AA meeting, the people there weren’t judging him; we were far too busy thinking about ourselves.

Many years ago, my favorite Delegate, Diane W., said that we should be careful about adopting new rituals in our meetings, because the people who got sober in those meetings would believe that that’s what you had to do to stay sober.... Lately it seems to me as if the chanting, the clapping and so forth have only increased. I understand this is normal exuberant group behavior, but it it doesn’t have much to do with AA.

Another thing I like to emphasize at these presentations is our concept of anonymity. I say that in practical terms, what this means is that if you attend an AA meeting,, we will guard your confidentiality... (And that we expect you to guard ours ...) Nowadays, I am at a loss to explain why we have live cameras trained on the members at hybrid Zoom meetings. Before Covid, I cannot remember ever seeing a camera at an AA meeting...

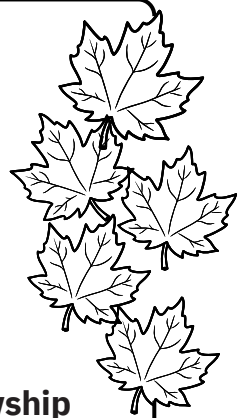
